#### Wirraminna Chats

I recently visited Wirraminna Residential Care home with the intention of interviewing a few of the residents on a couple of topics. Fortunately, 'the interviews' were very quickly sidelined, and I was lucky enough to just spend the time 'chatting' with new friends! We did make an effort to stay on task at times, but the side roads were just as interesting, if not more so!

Some of the ladies in the Op. Shop wanted to know the secrets of theresidents longevity – so I duly asked! I also asked if they had noticed any differences in the way Christmas is celebrated nowadays, as opposed to Christmas celebrations in the past. However, our random chatting was much more fun!

Val Griggs, 93 years young, has lived at Wirraminna for 10 years. She attributes her long life to much gardening in the past and, since being at Wirraminna, to keeping busy and to "driving everyone crazy by wanting to do things!" In addition, she walks every day – to keep the legs going!
 Val enjoys Christmas at Wirraminna as everyone helps with the festive decorations, there are many activities and entertainments provided, and the Christmas food is excellent.

Last Christmas was a Covid Lockdown and so the time could not be shared with Family in the normal way. Val said her grandchildren and great-grandchildren, who always make Christmas "lively", rocked up and provided, outside the building, a very noisy song and dance show for her to enjoy! Family has always been an important factor in every Christmas for Val, as have the Church Services.

• Iris Kies has only been at Wirraminna for a few months but agreed that gardening has always been something she has enjoyed, and that this has probably kept her going, although now she has to take care not to fall. She also walks every day and feels Family is a very important element of Christmas.

• Laurence Groverman, Williamstown's 105-year-old living legend, and I, totally strayed from the beaten track. Laurence talked and I scribbled away frantically! Any mistakes in this are mine! Laurence talked about how her father enlisted in WW1, from Victoria, but returned home as an injured, medically unfit for further action soldier, and was discharged as result. He was sent back to Bungaree Station to recuperate and then he, and the lass who had cared for him, were married, with Laurence being their first child. They then moved to Clare. When Eudunda Farmers opened a new store Laurence was chosen to work there as the Junior Girl and her husband-to-be was chosen as the Junior Boy. Laurence's first job was to sort through the flock used for bedding, but she worked her way up through areas like shoes, babywear, clothing and finally to serving the customers. She was transferred to the Eudunda Farmers Branch at Brinkworth before Laurence and her husband eventually arrived in Williamstown to manage the General Store, which supplied groceries, hardware and drapery. Laurence loved the community dancing in the Williamstown Hall on a Friday night. Her longevity she puts down to never making a nuisance of herself but, as for Christmas, she doesn't look forward to it nowadays, thinking it is more for young children – which reminded her of days past as a child, hanging the stockings on the line near the fireplace for Father Christmas to fill!

Beth, 95 years young also, told me that she has no secret for living a long life apart from 'just live healthily!", and she believes they have so much help to do that from the Staff of Wirraminna.
 As for Christmas, she sees it as a Family Event, large or small, depending on what people want to do. In the past, things were harder, so a bag of cherries was what the children looked forward to.
 Again, the Staff of Wirraminna were praised for their efforts in making Christmas such a happy time.
 And then we chatted about Beth, as a child, painting the beautiful white lilies in the river pink - with her mother's permission! I heard the story of a very pregnant Beth not being allowed on a horse-riding outing but being given the group's lunch, and a vehicle, and told to find a spot for their picnic.
 Unfortunately, they chose the wrong person for the job, as Beth became hopelessly lost, until she decided to just stay put and hope the others could find her.

They did, eventually, with hunger, I suspect, being the driving force. Another tale originated from the time Beth worked for a cobbler and shoe salesman. She purchased a pair of red, velvet slippers, trimmed with gold, and being extremely proud of them, crossed her legs and hung them out of the car window for all the world to see!

•Elaine is 85 and she attributes her long life to when, as a child in Murray Bridge, she chased rabbits with barking dogs as her companions. Mainly, though, it was "running away from Dad when he was going to belt us!" For Elaine, Christmas years ago, was about being with Family. Now the Family is scattered it is simply a matter of "whoever we can get our hands on!"

Everything has changed and more money is spent these days, whereas, in the past, times were harder and there was less money to bandy about. Elaine concluded by saying that many of the old-fashioned ways have gone, like hopping on a train with a free ticket, because you are married to a Railway Man, and chugging off for a short holiday or to say "Gidday!" to the oldies down the line!

Thank you very much to the lovely ladies who spent time chatting with me and Thank you very much to the Awesome Staff who work at Wirraminna and make such a wonderful home for all their residents! Wishing you all, Residents, Staff and Volunteers a Very Happy Christmas Season! L.L.

#### Wirraminna – Zane Eagland

Zane Eagland is the dedicated and friendly staff member at Wirraminna Care who organized my recent "Wirraminna Chats" visit. He carefully escorted my interviewees to a quiet place where we could chat and then returned them to wherever they needed to be. It was very obvious that he was well liked and trusted and that there was a very relaxed and friendly relationship between him and all the residents I met.

Zane arrived in Williamstown in 2010 at the age of ten. He attended our Williamstown School for the last three years of his Primary Education, apart from 6 months at St. Jakobi. His High School years were spent at Faith Lutheran College.

When he was 13 /14 years old his mother, whilst also studying nursing, was a Carer at Wirraminna Residential Care. As the then, Lifestyle Lady was not able work at theHome on some days, young Zane would help out, as a volunteer, during the school holidays with the bowling, which he enjoyed. He particularly liked to volunteer on 'Fish and Chip Fridays for lunch', because, as a volunteer, he would get it for free!!

Eight years ago, Zane stepped into the two hours, after school, paid role for 15/16 year olds, as a dishwasher. When Zane finished High School, he stayed on at Wirraminna working as a kitchenhand. Two years later he was asked if he would like to organise the Lifestyle Activities on a Wednesday. Zane really enjoyed the work, and especially the Wirraminna environment, and decided he would quietly go about training himself, online, which resulted in him achieving his Certificate 4 in Leisure and Health.

When the lady working as the Lifestyle Coordinator left Wirraminna, Zane stepped up as the Temporary replacement. Convinced that this was what he wanted to do, and at Wirraminna, Zane approached the Manager and asked to be considered for the permanent job. The response was 'Do the Carer's Course!' and, although Zane's first reaction was 'No, Thank You! he eventually agreed to do so and studied at Tafe gaining his accreditation.

Interestingly, Zane enjoys being a carer, but his real love is being the Lifestyle Coordinator, which he became, at Wirraminna, towards the end of 2019. Dreams can come true! Zane describes his role as providing the residents with activities they might like to take part in, activities like bowls, Bingo and exercise sessions. He organises lots of musical recreations, including live music entertainments and Pet Therapy, which includes bringing dogs and miniature ponies to the Residence.

Zane totally believes in the ethos of Wirraminna where staff work in the residents Home, and to that end he promotes a 'homely environment' and the concept that they are all one big family celebrating birthdays and special events together while meetings are organized once a month for Residents to voice their thoughts. Zane tries to get to know every resident and can string off a list of birth dates, anniversaries etc. in the most natural way. One of the residents told me he is just "Brilliant" in his care for them, and Zane loves his job because he likes the residents.

One of the most challenging times for Zane, the Lifestyle Coordinator, and indeed for Wirraminna residents, their families, staff and volunteers, was Covid. Zane is hoping that in 2025 his Wirraminna family will be able to become involved, once more, with our Williamstown Community with visits by students from the Williamstown Primary School and plans for the St. Jakobi students to help with gardening projects.

If the happy, smiling faces of the residents I met is anything to go by I would say Zane is 'a round peg in a round hole' and, like all the staff, is doing a great job at Wirraminna! L.L.

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
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#### **Snippets**

Unlike the snowy images often associated with Christmas, South Australians celebrate this sacred season during the height of summer, thus creating a festive atmosphere marked by sun filled days, happy gatherings and barbecues.



#### **Remembrance Day Service, Williamstown**



Held on 3 December between 10am and 1pm as part of International Day of People with Disability (IDPwD), the activities celebrate this year's theme, "Amplifying the leadership of persons with disabilities for an inclusive and sustainable future."

The day features local artist, Joshua Ramsey, who has turned his passion for art into teaching people about portrait techniques, as he works on achieving his own leadership goals.

Open to anyone with an interest in art, the free "Drawing a Portrait with Joshua" session will have participants showcasing their creativity with charcoal, pencils, and pastels from 11am to 12.30pm. SKILL Connector Alice Hyde, from JFA Purple Orange, will be in attendance with members of the peer network who live with disability. Their aim is to showcase leadership options and gather information from our community about what a safe space looks like and means to you.

For people living with disability and NDIS, Feros Care will also be on hand to answer questions and offer support with a Community Connections Plan.

Council's Community Development Officer, Natalie Mudge said the local IDPwD events are open to everyone, including those seeking more knowledge about disability.

"As a community we can break down perceptions and barriers and promote a supportive and inclusive Barossa," Natalie said.

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#### **The four Portuguese Bridges**

It's no secret that I have a fetish for bridges, and why not. Each bridge is unique and while there are similarities in modern bridges that is not the case with old historic ones. Each one was made of local materials and had to fit its own space therefore no two are quite the same.

This is not the only reason I find them fascinating. They were the foundation stones that helped build the young colony almost two hundred years ago. Imagine you are a teamster in the 1800s with twenty oxen and a heavy loaded wagon or dray. How difficult was it to transverse a raging torrent or a deep rocky creek bed.

Bridges were the catalyst to get things moving. Today we call it progress. Williamstown is surrounded by bridges as are most hills towns, and Williamstown has some of the most interesting. The one that really captures my imagination is the Portuguese Bridge, or should I say Bridges, four in all. That has to be something of a record. The South Para River would have been tricky in dry weather with its continually changing rocky bottom, but in winter with flooding water, how dangerous would it have been getting your animals and load across safely. So the little Portuguese Bridge was built. Just down the road from Portuguese George's Wine Shop.

Who was Portuguese George? – well that's another story.

Proposal to build a bridge was recorded in Council papers in 1889. The first little bridge was rustic and simple in its construction, Fig 1, but did the job. It was made of red gum logs and not level as one bank was higher than the other. However it lasted till 1923 when Council again recorded flood damage to the bridge and decided it was a waste of time and money repairing it again.

A new bridge was proposed at the cost of £275. Clear specification was given and a style, favoured by the Council, making use of local timber and gravel, Fig 2. Extra cost to build an access road was £124.12.0; quite a big expense for a small Council. I believe Council was expected to pay half of construction costs.

However the fates were not kind to this little bridge and in 1926 bushfires burnt it to the ground (all that lovely timber!). Now the Council had a dilemma, they still hadn't paid for the destroyed bridge and now need another one. A new bridge was designed costing,  $\pounds$ 1,450. This one, fire proof and made of concrete. The Council was left with half the cost of the new bridge and a carry-over from the last bridge.

In a letter from the Minister of Local Government Department to the Council, this cost was to be reduced to a quarter of the cost, but charged 6% interest on the balance owing. This must have filled the Council's heart with joy!!!

Sometime in the mid 1950-60 the Springton road was widened, straightened and sealed. This required a new bridge to be built. This is the one we use today. Straight, flat and well signed posted. Next time you pass that way pull off on the eastern side of the bridge. Get out of the car and follow the track down to the river. There you'll find, dreaming in the sunshine, the third Portuguese Bridge, and remnants of earlier bridges, and take a moment to contemplate the long, dramatic and turbulent history of this little bridge.
