Behind the Scenes with the Williamstown Amateur Players

Just recently I was fortunate enough to spend an hour in the company of our amazing Williamstown Amateur Players. When I arrived at the Institute Hall they were practising a scene from their up-coming pantomime, "Aladin Lost In Space", and it was such fun to watch.

There were more interruptions than actual lines being delivered as everyone worked on how best to present the story, where to stand, what to do with certain props, what feelings to emote, how their interactions with each other should evolve and what would work for the greatest comic effect!

Fortunately, the Director, from her viewing point in front of the stage, was able to make the final decisions on what would work best! But as a group they worked incredibly well together and there were lots of laughs, goodwill and supportive behaviour in evidence.

Established as a Fundraiser in 1981 by a group of Williamstown Primary School Parents who wished to purchase a fridge for the school, the Pantomime Ladies have continued to donate much of the money raised to Local Charities whilst operating themselves on a "shoestring budget."

Last year, Wirraminna Care Home was able to purchase a great outdoor setting for the residents due to the Ladies' donation. By making their own new costumes or adapting Previous ones, by collecting cardboard, boxes and 'bits and bobs', designing and creating their own scenery or borrowing props from their homes, the Ladies create the fairytale settings into which their wonderful performances transport us.

So good is their reputation that busloads come from places like Mannum, Outer Harbour, Woodside, Mount Pleasant and Greenock to experience the joy of pantomime so we locals had better get in there quickly and buy our tickets because we don't want to miss out on a really fun filled experience!

As soon as this year's pantomime is finished, the scriptwriters, usually Sue and Margie will begin writing for next season's performance. Auditions or 'Read Throughs' will then be held and roles allocated, followed by the choosing of the songs and the beginning of the many, many rehearsals every Tuesday.

There are no understudies so the task of learning their lines and never failing to turn up, especially to performances, are top priorities. However, as you would expect from this creative, determined group improvisation is second nature to them! The ladies have a Morning Tea Break at each rehearsal during which many matters are discussed. It is also a time to check out the well-being of members in a friendly, caring and supportive environment.

Considering the time and effort that goes into these productions, even if they are laced with heaps of laughter and fun, I have the utmost admiration for this year's cast which comprises of Suzanne, The President and a member for 33

years; Sue, Vice President, Director and script writer; Dawn, Musical Director; Babs, Secretary, with her beautiful assistance labrador, Gully, who unbelievably slept through most of the goings on and didn't laugh once!; Chris, Treasurer; Joan, Publicity; Jill, Stage Manager and Committee Member; Margie, script writer; Doreen, Margaret, Janet, Allysha, (Suzanne's daughter), Brenda, Brianna and Erin; Michelle, (Sue's daughter) Front of House at Performances.

Most of the Players are of a mature age but there are a few young ones amongst them. I am positive that they would welcome, with open arms, any ladies, young or older, from around and about, who would like to join them in this community volunteer enterprise which brings pleasure to young and old alike!

Jane Rowe is the lovely face behind Violet's Pantry on Queen Street, Williamstown.

Jane and her husband, Richard, moved onto 16 acres of land in the Mount Crawford area about 30 years ago.

Living in a shed and caravan on the property with their four children, Jane and Richard then set about building a home, literally, with their own hands.

Interestingly, they were reconstructing the dismantled Catholic manse from Birdwood which was already on the site. Although they moved into the house after about a year Jane says it is still – "a Work in Progress!, but it is in a beautiful spot and close to her place of work here in Williamstown".

For many years Jane has worked in the Hospitality Industry, from Café C in Springton to the Plush Group of Hotels where she was offered a TAFE Course and became a fully qualified chef. From there she went to the Novotel Resort for five years, became Head Chef at the Mount Pleasant Hotel and then wound up at Artisans of Barossa, in Tanunda. Ready to run her own establishment by this stage, Jane checked out the Gawler Eatery's

Landscape but found it unappealing.

Their loss is Williamstown's gain as, after discovering her current business site was available and spending a few months thinking deeply about the whole scheme, Jane launched 'Violet's Pantry'!

And where did the name come from? Well, apparently, it just presented itself one day, from who knows where, while Jane was washing the dishes at home!!!

Jane believes country people should not have to go to the city to find something different in the way of food.

Open for Breakfast, Brunch and Lunch and great coffee from 'Mighty Mighty Coffee' in Lobethal all the time.

Jane is assisted for four days each week by local lady Linda Miels who was "picked up", so the story goes, by Jane in the local Op Shop, that Little Shop of Treasures!!

All the food in Violet's is house made, from cakes and scones to toasted gourmet sandwiches, or it is locally sourced.

On a Thursday, Jane imports Gluten Free and Vegan treats from Clara's Cakes in Lobethal. On Saturday mornings, fresh sour dough loaves from Breaking Bread at Angaston are available for purchase. Open Wednesday through to Sunday from 8am until 3pm ish, Violet's Pantry provides a calm, friendly environment in which to meet friends, strike up conversations with acquaintances or strangers at the next tables, or even to hold small meetings.

The Last Games of Football and Netball at the Williamstown Oval. Saturday the 24 th of August 2024 was a day of many mixed feelings for everyone associated with our local community football and netball club, the mighty Barossa Bulldogs.

The day dawned with a typical football/netball morning mist shrouding the oval and causing a group of our Freeling visitors, our opponents for the day, fresh from their hometown sunshine, to groan as they saw that all too familiar white scene before them. The mist cleared quickly, the matches began, and the competition was fierce.

Everyone put in their best effort to do their Club proud. Our Netball Girls sported specially designed, eye-catching T-shirts, while our A and B Grade footballers each wore a heritage Guernsey.

Unfortunately, our Freeling visitors put in their best effort also and, although they did their very best, our U13, U15 and Reserves football teams were all beaten. This meant that Freeling won the much valued 'Ike Cup', having won three of the five matches!

On the Netball courts play was just as intense with some quite close matches eventuating. Our Sub Junior 1, our Junior 1 and our Inter 2 all scored wins for us while Freeling went home with wins in the other 8 matches.

Despite this, Netball was buzzing, as indeed the whole of Queen Victoria Jubilee Park was. There was almost a Carnival atmosphere, players from years gone by catching up with everyone; current U17's, playing at Central Districts, were back for the day supporting their Home Team as Drink Runners; sponsors, our Women's Football Teams, our Junior football teams were all represented and formed part of a wonderful, enthusiastic, record-breaking crowd!

At the A Grade Half Time, our U11's and our U9's entertained the noisy, appreciative crowd with short matches.

I made a complete nuisance of myself on the day by randomly approaching Club Members and Spectators and indeed, even Freeling visitors, to ask how they were feeling on this last day of play at the Williamstown Oval and how they felt about the big move to the brand new complex at Lyndoch. The two questions merged but the overall feeling was that the move would be a really good thing!

Many said that our Netball/Football Facilities here were old and tired, that we had outgrown them, and, with no room for expansion, the new Facilities at Lyndoch were offering our Club a much more suitable and exciting venue with more opportunities and new experiences for the players. One spectator commented that a rumoured upgrade had been on the cards for 20 odd years, so for many of us, it is an exciting culmination to years of hoping and dreaming, while for others it has been years of planning, effort and time volunteered.

One volunteer is particularly looking forward to better BBQing Facilities – and it is things like this that we are also hoping to see improvements in. Parking was a concern for many who hoped the planners had taken into consideration the needs of a Rural Community with ample parking around the ovals, a country tradition!

For Netball – any parking has to be better than what they have now!

When asked, most of our young players admitted to being very excited about the upgrade. As one U15 player put it, "we'll feel more a part of The Valley and be closer to the other Clubs!" The quote of the day, however, must go to the young gentleman player who, when asked how he felt about leaving Williamstown, said that although "It's not great it's our little shithole!" Apologies to anyone who takes offence, but I thought it summed up the community spirit and loyalty that our young people have towards their club and their town.

Waiting by the fence, supporting the U15's play, the U17's team consensus was that, Although our Williamstown Grounds will be missed, it will be for the best and that bigger and better things are coming! After all, as one of them said, we are "The Best Club!"

Many people felt that the setting for our Club was really picturesque, and we certainly won't have the stately pines and the grand old hill behind the clubrooms in our new location. As one parent pointed out, "That Hill has babysat generations of our younger children!" It remains to be seen what our new grounds can offer to replace this!!

After the A Grade Match, Presentations and Mayor Bim Lange's speech, after the huge photo was taken of everyone present who had had any role to play in the Club over the years, after most of the participants had gone home, many still lingered, socialising well into the night and reminiscing about past triumphs, friendships made and "Club Characters"!

Although the Williamstown Queen Victoria Jubilee Park may not hear too many sirens, whistles, roaring crowds and thundering feet on its netball courts and grassy, footy oval in the future, these fixtures will hopefully remain to continue use as the second cricket oval for the Sandy Creek Cricket Club and, for at least next season, the shouts and thumps of our Lyndoch (Williamstown) Little Athletics Club will awaken the now silent grounds.

Jodie Grantham, President of the Netball Club, feels that the new venue will make us more of a unified club, that it will be the best regional grounds in South Australia, a Great Sporting Ground. "Why wouldn't you want to be a part of that? It's going to be brilliant!"

In conclusion, Jason Thiele, Football President, said, "While it is sad to be leaving Williamstown which holds so many memories for so many people, the move to new facilities at Lyndoch is very exciting and provides the community with an amazing facility. An amazing venue for the future!" L.L.


