The Williamstown Pharmacy Building - Past and Present.

The Pharmacy Building in Williamstown, or "The Chemist's" as it is more commonly called, started its life as a Garage. It was built by Morris and Eva Kassebaum who realised their 'Williamstown Garage' business, opened in 1946 diagonally across the road from their new premises, had become too small. "The new premises was a modern building for the era and incorporated a car showroom, spare parts area and office, along with a large workshop and drive through lube bay, 2 hoists, crash repair area, tow truck and RAA services. It was supplied with Ampol fuel to the two bowsers. Locals were employed in the workshop and office. The garage opened in 1960 with locals invited to a Motoring Film Night with refreshments." As the new-look 'Williamstown Garage' was fuelled by Ampol, which sponsored Donald Campbell's mighty, record-setting 'Bluebird' boat, Williamstown was included in the Bluebird Boat's grand tour of towns within the state. All the starry- eyed primary school children came down to the garage to see it resting on the back of its semi-trailer. John Kassebaum, Morris and Eva's son, recalls how his father was happy to fill the school children's bicycle tyres with air and mend their punctures for free, in the hope that when they graduated to cars and needed fuel and tyres and parts, they would continue to come to him!! After WW2, Morris sold Austin, Morris and Wolseley cars and Austin trucks, far outstripping the Metropolitan Car Dealers and pretty much flooding the area with those three breeds! In 1970 Morris passed away but Eva, and son John, kept the business running until 1974, with the support of their staff. The business was then sold to Ted Grounds who continued to service the community in the same way as the Kassebaums had. Eventually a partnership took over the garage with Allan Christian being the last garage man standing. (The above Information was compiled by John Kassebaum. Many Thanks John!) The building then entered a quiet period with only the back part in use on a couple of occasions by Spray Painters, while at another time it was used for storage of stock by the Domain Day Winery, which was located for a spell in the Foresters Hall. (Juliana, from the current Pharmacy, now takes over the writing of our story. With Many Thanks, Juliana!) "The front of the building was converted into a pharmacy in 2011 and then the current owner, Nasir, bought the pharmacy in 2016. Nasir also owns and runs the Coromandel Valley Pharmacy. Both these businesses are Independent Pharmacies. With the wonderful support from the local community, the pharmacy grew from its humble beginnings into a busy little hub of activity - often being a place of conversation, friends bumping into each other, both old and new, much laughter and tears and of course an ever-increasing range of pharmacy services. We just try to do our best to provide care and service to our community and visitors from far and wide. We cater for babies through to the elderly, people looking for true health solutions as well as patching people up if something has gone awry. Really, this shop has been shaped by the local people coming here, requesting their favourite items to be stocked etc. Now, in 2025, Nasir has renovated the pharmacy making it even bigger. This extra space will allow us to provide better services to the community such as a dedicated Webster packing area so that we can more effectively pack medications in weekly blister packs for Williamstown's Aged Care Facility, Wirraminna, as well as for members of the Community, both young and old. It is a convenient, no fuss way to carry and keep track of medications at home. A private consulting room will allow us to provide the increasing number of services that pharmacies can now provide, such as prescribing antibiotics for urinary tract infections, oral contraceptive pills and blood pressure monitoring, sick certificates and any new services as they become legislated. The extra space in the shop will house all your old favourites plus some new ranges, such as Herbal teas, Tissue salts, more home care health items, as well as pet medicines and a larger first aid section. So, keep your suggestions coming as you can help shape your pharmacy too. I have a background in natural medicines as well as being a pharmacist and I have studied herbalism, nutritional and environmental medicine as well as other complementary therapies so, with me, you can get the best of both worlds." The Pharmacy Team consists of Juliana and Rose, Sheryl, Nina, Madeleine and Tina. The majority are locals, but all enjoy working for the Community-minded Nasir and with each other!





The Men's Shed is a concept which is growing in popularity and increasing in number in Australia and around the globe. It provides an outlet for men, much in the same way that the backyard shed has in Australian culture over many years. The Southern Barossa Mens Shed extends a welcome to men

The Whispering Wall

There is so much more to it than its ability to transport sound along its curved wall, and hold back water, and there is no doubt that it is a phenomenon that is not fully understood. There are only a few places in the world that have achieved this amazing feat. It was also the first arch dam in South Australia, the highest in Australia and one of the first true arch dams built in the world to generated international interest.

Why build it? At the end of the 1800s the town of Gawler and surrounding areas were running out of clean water. The South Para and local bores, the only source of water for a growing town, were becoming contaminated. So the plan was to build a dam on Yettie Creek.

Alexander Bain Moncrieff, an Irish engineering draughtsman was commissioned to draw up plans for the dam wall. His curved dam was controversial at the time, but the authorities put their trust in Moncrieff and in 1899 the wall began; Moncrieff having convinced them a curved wall was the most economical.

Although the structure may look simply there was nothing simple about it. For instance, the cement used was imported from England in barrels and aerated for 14 days in a large shed. Stone from near the site was crushed to three different sizes, to a maximum size of 2 inches (5cm)." Plums" or large stones for the lower portion of the wall were quarried near the site. Four different mixes of materials were used according to the height of the wall. Construction was carried out in horizontal layers each one carefully bonded to the layer below. Weather was monitored as extreme heat or cold could affect the curing process. On cold frosty nights the top was wrapped in straw mattresses and fires were lit in tar drums and placed near to the wall.

Ten metres thick at the bottom and tapering to under a metre at the top the slender curve was reinforced with tram tracks, second hand from the Gawler main street. This gave strength to the narrow top without compromising the width. For all this attention to detail it was built in only three years. There were an estimated 400 workers, and it necessitated the building of a temporary small town. The working week was 48 hours, and the base pay rate was 48 shilling per week.

It is sad that a dark shadow has been cast over it in recent times, because it is a wonderful structure and deserves so much better publicity.

Remembering Pamela Murray-White and the origins of Operation Flinders

Williamstown and its environs have had several remarkable personalities over the years, some memorable in good ways and some in not so good ways.

One of the shining lights that has left a great legacy in terms of wellbeing for the youth of the State of South Australia is Pamela Murray White.

Her name known to a lot of current residents of Williamstown, though it is the town that is associated with her – but the project that she initiated is well known throughout the state. Pamela commenced her project of Operation Flinders in her family shed on Yettie Road near the Whispering Wall in 1991.

For those that wish to know more of her story, there is a great write up on the Operation Flinders website Autobiographical Pam Murray-White | Operation Flinders Foundation, and in her words: It was in those early days of 1991 that I conceived Operation Flinders. It just seemed right, as the kids with the real behaviour problems seemed to lack direction, self-esteem, decent challenge and good role modelling.

She died in August 1995 - which is 30 years ago. She is remembered by several people in Williamstown; however we all need to know of her good work and take time to remember.

SALA – Allana Frank and Violet's Pantry

Since 1998, throughout the month of August, The South Australian Living Artists Festival (SALA) has celebrated "the many talented visual artists in South Australia". With over 9,000

participating artists and 600 venues the aim of SALA has been to extend the visual arts audiences and be inclusive of visual artists of any level, working in any medium. As one of the chosen venues, Violet's Pantry has extended an invitation to local artist, Allana Frank, to exhibit her work at this popular Coffee and Food haunt in Williamstown, throughout August. As is the case with many of Jane's customers, Allana has become a friend, and when Jane saw some of Allana's work posted on Instagram, she approached her with the view to exhibiting her work at Violet's Pantry during the SALA Festival. This will be Allana's first solo Showing! Allana, and husband Simon, served together in the Australian Airforce for 35 years at bases in Wagga, Newcastle, Edinburgh, Melbourne, Canberra, Brisbane and Richmond (NSW). In addition to this, they were deployed overseas twice, once to East Timor and once to Iraq. They retired to Williamstown in 2019. As a child, in Hobart, Allana was encouraged by her mother, herself an artist, to draw and to try her hand at watercolours. When she inherited all her mother's paints and tools of the trade, Alanna found that, in using them, it helped to reduce stress levels. Nowadays, she experiments with not only the watercolours but also with inks and acrylics. Throughout Covid Allana attended art classes in Handorf with well-known artist Christina Metelli, but after Covid and the move to Williamstown, she now attends the 'A to Z Art Group' run by Ernesto Zollo at The Men's Shed on a Monday night. As Allana points out, Art Groups are great places to meet people and make friends. Alanna paints for the sheer enjoyment of it these days, often starting with a photo that may have been taken whilst on overseas travel, or caravan and camping anywhere in this beautiful country of ours. As well as the camera, her artist's tools go travelling too, so her painting may have been taken directly from the current scenery. Allana's paintings just "happen", depending on how she feels on a given day, how the colours develop on the canvas.....! There is a leaning towards impressionism, which can evoke in the viewer remembered emotions or places. The use of imagination is evident, not only in the paintings, but in their titles also, and they all come, at the present time, in 8cm-by-8cm frames, easy for travellers' souvenirs or for walls already running out of hanging spaces. Unfortunately, Alanna and Simon will not be around in August, as they will be out in the Bush they so love, on The Canning Stock Route in W.A., four-wheel driving on a challenging, almost 2,000 km long, historic track! Fortunately, however, Jane will be holding the SALA fort here in Williamstown, so make sure you head into Violet's Pantry to enjoy Allana's paintings - which are also for sale. L.L.
