Lewis Johnston – Second owner of the Victoria Creek Hotel

Born 1817 in Dunnottar Scotland, he immigrated to Sydney on October 6, 1841 on the ship James Moran. He was 24 years old, and a single blacksmith. He had been sponsored by Messes Robert Howe and Co and received a bounty of £19. In 1846 he was living in South Australia, but it is not known how he arrived in the state. Soon after he was living in Gawler and one thing is clear, he was an opportunist and speculator and had fingers in many pies, including property, hotels, horse trading and dealing in wrought iron. It is hard to keep pace with all his activities. However, on December 13 1847 he married Eliza Hawkins in Gawler and the couple had six children.

In 1850 Lewis Johnston announced he was retiring from the business of blacksmithing and was now a dealer in wrought iron and he always had Scottish iron ploughs. In 1854 he appears to have had shops in Gawler for his wrought iron business, and as a blacksmith he would be well suited to this business. He seemed also to have a passion for horses and was involved in horse breeding and horse dealing, but in 1852 he was granted a publican license for the Old Bushman Hotel in Gawler. Just another thing to keep him occupied at home.

Lewis Johnston certainly kept the newspapers busy recording all his activities by getting himself fined for not closing his bar-room door on Lord's Day, to getting himself stabbed in the leg by Cranky Jack.

On Tuesday January 1857 there appeared in The Adelaide Observer a sale notice by George Warren on behalf of Thomas Adams for the sale of his property at Victoria Creek, consisting of good land and the Victoria Hotel, with the terms being part cash. This was too much for Lewis Johnston to resist and he bought the property.

Did he ever live there? Probably not, as most of his interests were in Gawler, and George Snellgrove had a seven-year lease on the property and hotel. He obviously had grand plans for the land and employed a surveyor to subdivide the land into allotments (see plan). He named his new property Williamstown. It is quite reasonable to presume it was named after his new son. He also named other streets, Eliza, Margaret, George and Queen Street.

He certainly was interested in Mt Crawford Council's plan to build a bridge over Victoria Creek at the bottom of Queen Street, and on his property. No doubt he recognized the value to his hotel. In 1858 he was also a member of a committee of trustees for a piece of land to build a school. Just a week later he announced he was leaving the town, and by 1858 he had acquired the Miner's Arms Hotel in Kapunda.

On October 9, 1858, an advertisement in the South Australian Weekly Chronicle announced an "import sale of property" and amongst the numerous properties was the Victoria Hotel and land. Lewis Johnston was cash strapped and "owing to the pressure of the times, and his entering a new business Mr. Lewis Johnston had instructed George Warren to sell the whole of his freehold property". Had he had been sailing too close to the wind?


So, what went wrong for Lewis Johnston? His wife claims he had a bad fall from a horse five years previously and had never been quite the same since. Whether it was the fall or money problems, sometime after August 18, 1862, Lewis Johnston took his life by hanging, a very sad and lonely ending to an energetic and productive life.

His influence on the developing township of Williamstown cannot be underestimated, as he laid the foundation for what the town looks like today. Although he probably never lived there, he took an interest in establishing the first school building, and new Council projects, such as the Victoria Creek Bridge and the Mt Crawford Road development.

Had he not had the land subdivided and the town laid out, Victoria Creek may have remained just a pub on a road through to Gawler and Adelaide. It is more than likely Thomas Adams and Lewis Johnston were known to each other as a newspaper article showed that Thomas Adams frequented the Old Bushman Hotel.

And what about that mob of horses? Well, you can draw your own conclusion. For me, and given that Tom Adams was a butcher, I'd be very worried if he was buying mobs of horses!

Anne and Simon Taylor

It is with a certain sadness that I record the loss of two stalwart volunteers from the Williamstown Community. Anne and Simon Taylor are moving to the city to downsize and to be closer to their growing family. Simon joined the navy as a 15-year-old in 1968 and met Anne at the University of NSW, in Sydney, in 1971 when he was studying Electrical Engineering and Anne Physiotherapy. They married in 1977 and then received naval postings every two years, including overseas, for training and postgraduate study. For Simon's last sea posting in Sydney, Anne spent a great deal of time on her own bringing up the couple's two children, Amanda and Michael, whilst also working part-time as a physiotherapist at the Prince Alfred Hospital. In 1988 Simon secured a posting to DSTO (WRE), in Salisbury, to work on the Jindalee Radar Project. As both Simon and Anne wanted a country lifestyle for their children, one similar to their own - Simon's on Kangaroo Island and Anne's on a farm in Canowindra, NSW - a property on Needles Road, Williamstown was chosen and the family lived there for 2 years. Having arrived in Williamstown with a 5-year-old and a 3-year-old Anne found herself quickly being introduced into the Community by Sue Guy, Helen Harvey and Jane Young. Then, in 1991 came work for Anne in Domiciliary Care at the Lyell McEwin Hospital, Simon resigned from the navy to work in sonar research in DSTO and the couple bought a beautiful house and property on Winkley Road, living there for the past 35 years. In 2001 Anne moved on to Barossa Health Services working in Angaston Domiciliary Care. She retired from this in 2016. Throughout her children's time at Williamstown Primary School Anne was an amazing volunteer, prepared to help wherever, and with whatever was needed. She joined the Parent Club, helped with the Canteen, Sports Days, Working Bees, listened to students read, helped with classroom activities, covered books in the library – the list is endless. Just as involved with the school was Simon, who served on the School's Governing Council as Chairperson as well as organizing many Grounds projects and working bees.

And then there was Sport! Anne played competitive tennis and netball - keeping their records for over 8 years; with Amanda, Anne played softball for the Barossa Bears and Simon coached. Michael played basketball and cricket for Lyndoch – and Anne, the passionate cricket fan and member of SACA, scored. But Michael played football too, starting in the Modifieds with Dad, Simon as Team Manager before moving on to play for Central Districts then the Uni. Blacks. Meanwhile, Simon was in the thick of the football culture, contributing as Junior Football President, as a Trainer, as the President of the Football and Netball Club for 4 years. Simon also enjoys sailing and his stepfather, Les, who lived with Simon's mother in the Granny Flat attached to Simon and Anne's house for 25 years, had a 30-foot yacht moored at the Royal South Australian Yacht Squadron at Outer Harbour. For over 10 years Les, Simon, Gen Thompson, Paul Guy and Tim Andrews would go sailing together. Nowadays, Simon, Gen and Tim take Les, now in a rental unit at Wirraminna, to the RSAYS' Old Salt's BBQ every Wednesday. Anne was on the Board of Abbeyfield (the forerunner to Wirraminna), volunteering there from 2012, while Simon was Chair of the Board for 4 years, assisting in the transfer from Abbeyfield to Wirraminna. Anne still volunteers at Wirraminna and plans to continue to keep in touch. Since 2015 Simon has been involved with a small group of people who have helped transform a business group into the Southern Barossa Community Alliance which, includes in its aims, advocating on behalf of the Southern Barossa Community -

- providing 'a voice' for Community Groups to have their say promoting events and tourism
- brought the first Tour Down Under to the Barossa
- set up a Community Health/Well-Being Group
- piloted many projects including, during Covid, the providing of emergency relief meals (which are still being run now by the Barossa Kiwanis)
- established the Barossa Drug Action Team and the Drug Support Group

- helped establish the South Para Park Run
- helped the ROAR
- facilitated an initial Dementia Support Group in Williamstown
- facilitated a Youth Expo in Williamstown
- assisted the Barossa Wildlife Rescue to become an independent corporation and charity supported by a properly qualified team.

Although this sounds like a saga of the SBA it is important to remember that without volunteers like Simon, who give up so much time and put in so much effort and are passionate about their community and its needs – these wonderful things just might not happen!

Simon, who was awarded the Australia Day Citizen of the Year Award in 2022, worries that not enough people are putting up their hands to take on volunteer work these days, particularly in the Health a Well Being areas.

In their 'spare time' Anne and Simon enjoy travelling, particularly with friends, and share a sporting pastime – skiing! They have skied in Australia, Canada, Europe, New Zealand and Japan. They have also hosted 3 exchange students from Japan during the time their children were studying at Faith Lutheran School, whilst their daughter Amanda was herself an exchange student to Japan.

Amanda went on to gain a Degree in Psychology, then her Masters, worked for a while in the AP Lands at Alice Springs in Child Protection, returned to do her PHD in 'Sleep' and is now Senior Lecturer in Psychology at Adelaide Uni. Michael is a Physiotherapist and has worked in various Practices, including a snow season in Japan, but currently he is a Team Leader for a company called 'Striker' which looks after the theatre Robotics used in hip and knee surgery.

Anne and Simon both agree they will miss Williamstown, but they plan to visit frequently as they have made so many real friends here. They have always appreciated the land on which they have lived and the opportunity to be part of a great community life. They in turn, have been greatly appreciated by





Happy 10th Birthday Southern Barossa Mens Shed!

On December 14th, 2014, well-known local identity Glen Venning called a meeting to consider if there was enough interest for establishing a Mens Shed in Williamstown. The meeting was held in the small front lounge of Wirraminna (or Abbeyfield as it was then). As the interest was there, a more formal meeting was held in the January of 2015, again at Wirraminna, with an attendance of 9 interested persons who decided to pursue the project. Assisted throughout its 10 years by Wirraminna, the Mens Shed began in a little 20 by 20-foot garage in the grounds of Wirraminna. It was opened officially by the then State Member for Shubert, Stephan Knoll, in the December of 2015. Generous support by the local community and Banksia Park TAFE set them up with lots of materials and equipment. This wonderful support and donating continues to this day! November the 14th 2020, saw the move to their bespoke 40 by 30-foot New Shed behind the Little Shop of Treasures, with whom they have a similar close relationship as they do with Wirraminna. Local lad Alex Gill donated his labour in the levelling of the ground for this shed, while local electrician, Peter Keelan, sorted out all the electrical work for free also. When the keys were handed over in May, the Mens Shed Members all busied themselves with the interior work, creating closed off Meeting Room and toilet areas, and installing their donated equipment. Along the way they have been helped with Grants from the Barossa Council and The Australian Mens Shed Association. In 2024 a second shed, 20 by 20-foot was donated by Klose's Foodland as they cleared the site for our soon to be Supermarket! This shed was quickly deconstructed and marched across the road by Shed Members to be rebuilt on their site as a metal workshop! The Group has grown from the original 8 members to 27 and now includes adult males in the southern Barossa area, including those employed, retired or on Benefits. I quote from a Mens Shed article – "Coffee Time is the best time! Sometimes with all the banter you need your rubber boots to get through all the you know what!" But the Mens Shed has 'got it so right'! Their Morning Tea Time/Coffee Time is their Meeting Time/Decision Making Time! No long-drawn-out meetings for them! So envious – especially when I think of the hours and hours wasted in boring meetings around the country! The other thing I love about the Mens Shed is the absolute refuting of the 'fact' that 'men don't gossip'!! Don't they just!! The Mens Shed's great strength lies in its ability to make all members feel welcome. There is a sincere spirit of camaraderie and a sense of personal worth amongst the men. You do not have to come to The Shed with anything but yourself, nor do you need to do anything – just have a coffee and a natter! Once there, you can undertake your own projects if you wish or you'll find heaps of interesting activities going on and, if you choose to do so, you can develop skills in many practical areas in a supportive and helpful environment. Lots of 'sharing' goes on! On Tuesday and Wednesday mornings, the members can be found doing tasks for the School, the History Society, Wirraminna, the Op. Shop, Barossa Wildlife ('nesting boxes') and for many locals as well as themselves. They are the BBQ experts and fundraise for various organizations as well as for themselves, including, in September this year, raising \$526 towards Tony Pasin's Prostrate Cancer Awareness Fund. When asked of their hopes and plans for the future, three projects surfaced – renovating the old jail next to their Shed, pursuing, in conjunction with our Historical Society, the possibility of creating a forge for Blacksmithing and thirdly, extending the use of their Metal Shed. However, the main plan is to simply keep on enjoying each other's company and welcoming new members. I doubt they will have any trouble doing this! (And, I should point out, that many womenfolk applaud this opportunity to have the two mornings a week free for themselves!!)

Time to hit the brakes on migration

Australia is an immigration success story.

Over generations, cultures from the four corners of the earth have been woven delicately into the fabric of our nation.

This success wasn't accidental it was curated by careful and considered government policy. Historically the Australian Government has developed and managed immigration policies that responded to the needs of Australian society.

Take the influx of European immigrants at the conclusion of World War II. Post war Australia was rapidly growing but the first and second world wars had seen 103,000 Australian men lost (and many more maimed), fathers and sons who would, but for giving up their futures for ours, have returned to Australia as a labour force ready to build modern Australia.

Desperately short on labour the Australian Government turned to Europe, offering young men and their families, including my own, the prospect of a better life.

It was an immigration policy centred on the needs of the Australian people, a policy in the national interest that put Australians first.

Between 1945 and 1995, a period spanning 50 years, Australia settled 5.3 million migrants, a little over 100,000 per annum. The first twenty years of this century saw net overseas migration of 4.4 million, or an annual intake of 220,000.


Fast forward to today, an Australia facing an unprecedented housing crisis, made worse by the relaxation of our immigration settings. Indeed, over the past three years Australia has welcomed close to 1.2 million new arrivals and in the twelve months to 30 September 2025 net permanent and long- term arrivals reached 468,390. That rate is accelerating and can fairly be described as unprecedented, unsustainable and contrary to the national interest. Little wonder that Australians want their Government to hit the brakes on migration, at least until the supply of housing and the delivery of critical infrastructure like roads, hospitals and schools catches up.

Having dumped Net Zero the Coalition urgently needs to develop an immigration strategy that ends this era of mass migration and in so doing puts Australians first.

First Steps in Williamstown

Newly started in Williamstown and affiliated with the Transform Uniting Church, here and in Gawler, is a First Steps Playgroup. Kaitlyn Phillips is the Family Connections Pastor, but it was Em who ran me through the weekly Playgroup routine, which occurs at the W/T Uniting Church Hall every Wednesday between 9.30am and 11am during the school term. It is open to any child aged between 0 to 4 or 5years old and not attending school. The Gawler Playgroup operates on a Thursday.

Briefly the session starts with Free Play for the children, which often incorporates sensory experiences and has a Theme for the day (Animals when I was there), with craft activities to do then and there, or to take home. 10am is fruit, snack time for the children and Barista made coffee, hot chocolate, etc. for the parents!

This 'domestic work' is done by local Uniting Church volunteers – Heather, Gloria, Debbie, Sue and David. From 10.40 -10.45am it is 'Parachute' time, followed by themed - singing, some awesome dancing, a story – finally their Goodbye song.

UCare Gawler has a table of donated goods which operates on a 'help yourself' basis, and there is a Clothes Swap Rack.

The first visit is free with, thereafter, a \$5 note covering a session for the whole family - including the snacks and coffees!! It is a safe place for children to play and for parents, mainly mothers, to meet and interact with others similarly placed, bringing up very young children, as well as helping with integration into the community.

I spoke with a few of the young mothers in attendance who were busy supporting their children's play, to find out what they thought of First Steps. Kim enjoys the 'Community feel' and engaging with other parents. She likes everything about the Playgroup and what it offers while young son Joel likes the fun and the snacks. Daughter, Eden, was almost too busy playing, singing and dancing creatively, to even consider the question for long! Jess and Jess, two young mothers who knew each other in Darwin and have, by sheer coincidence, met up again at Playgroup, agree that the Playgroup has been so welcoming. They love Williamstown and they love the Playgroup for its structure and routine for the children and feel it provides an alternative to the isolation of childcare at home which, in turn, is good for mental health. Little Emma just loves going to Playgroup. They would highly recommend the Playgroup to Everyone! Kayla, who attends both W/T and Gawler Playgroups, has two little ones in tow, a two-year-old and a four-year-old, both of whom love meeting up with their little friends at Playgroup. Kayla knows what it's like for people who 'Do it Tough' so appreciates the great support, the table of donated goods and its treats. She sees it as a great opportunity to meet the locals as everyone is friendly and welcoming. Quickly chatting to Rebekah outside as the children began to pack up and head in for parachute time, I discovered that her daughter loves playgroup and Rebekah appreciates the real coffee!! Chelsea's daughter also loves coming to Playgroup and Chelsea thinks the Community Table is a great idea and considers the Playgroup well run with friendly staff.

Following the 'outsiders' inside to watch the final minutes of the session, I discovered the parents waving the parachute up and down as the children scrambled about under it or ran in and out, giggling and having great fun. Then it was Em, out the front, music playing behind her on the big TV, bouncing up and down like a rabbit, as she led the young ones in the singing, dancing, percussion playing and finger plays.

PASIN CLAIMS VICTORY AS LABOR FORCED TO DUMP SPEED LIMIT REDUCTION PLAN

Federal Member for Barker Tony Pasin MP has declared a victory for regional Australians as the Albanese Labor Government's plan to slash speed limits on country roads collapses under the weight of public pressure.

Mr Pasin, who has led the public and parliamentary fight against the proposal, said the news that "no further work is being undertaken" on the plan is not an example of government leadership - it is a forced retreat.

"Make no mistake - this backdown wasn't voluntary," Mr Pasin said. "This is a victory earned by regional Australians who refused to be punished for Labor's policy failures. Labor didn't walk away because they saw sense; they walked away because we made it impossible for them not to."

Mr Pasin first exposed the proposal in late October, labelling it "lazy, outrageous and economically damaging," warning that cutting speed limits from 100km/h to as low as 70km/h would crush productivity while doing nothing to improve road safety. He repeated those arguments in Parliament highlighting that road conditions - not speed limits - are the true threat to safety on rural roads.

Mr Pasin also exposed what he described as the "backdoor Net Zero agenda" buried in Labor's own Regulatory Impact Analysis, showing that emissions reduction modelling formed a material part of the justification for reducing speed limits.

"Labor tried to dress this up as a road safety reform, but their own documents reveal the truth," Mr Pasin said. "This was about meeting their unrealistic emissions reduction targets on the backs of regional motorists, freight operators and farmers. They just hoped no one would read the fine print."

Mr Pasin said the turning point came when he publicly pressured the Government to extend its rushed consultation period - a demand Labor was ultimately forced to grant after widespread backlash across regional Australia.

Following that extension, South Australian Labor's Transport Minister publicly rejected the proposal, isolating the Federal Government and leaving the Prime Minister with nowhere to go.

"When their own state Labor governments refused to touch it, the writing was on the wall," Mr Pasin said. "Regional Australia stood up. State Labor backed down. And now the Federal Government has been forced to abandon the plan altogether."

Mr Pasin said while today's outcome is a win for regional Australia, it must also be a wake-up call.

"This proposal was being considered to distract from the state of our road network avoid the costs associated with repairing them," Mr Pasin said. "South Australia alone is facing a \$2 billion road maintenance backlog. That is where the Prime Minister's focus should be - not on slowing down regional Australians to meet ideological targets."

Mr Pasin urged residents across Barker to stay alert, warning that "once Labor floats a policy like this, they rarely give up for good."

"Regional Australians have won this round," Mr Pasin said. "But I will keep fighting - because if Labor tries to resurrect this plan, or anything like it, they will find me and my community standing in their way."


