New sponsorship program to boost local events

Filling the calendar with diverse events for every season is the goal of an exciting new initiative launched by The Barossa Council this week.

Designed to attract a broader audience to the region, the new Events Sponsorship Program invites local community groups and event organisers to apply for a share in \$30,000 to not only bring new events to life but also help favourites flourish.

Mayor Bim Lange welcomed the sponsorship offering which will further enhance the region's reputation as an event destination.

"This is an opportunity for our much loved traditional and established events, like town Christmas parades for example, to continue to receive support," Mayor Lange said.

"But we'd also love to see new, innovative, 'out of the box' events added to our calendar as well. This program gives our local community the opportunity to bring interesting new ideas to the table, events that might need an extra helping hand to get over the line.

"Ultimately, we want visitors to come to the Barossa and be pleasantly surprised throughout the year. We do food and wine well, but we can offer so much more to attract a different audience looking for a different experience."

Mayor Lange said the Event Sponsorship Program will help create a diverse range of unique attractions to boost the local economy, especially in those traditionally slower months of the year.

"By supporting events in this way, we offer more reasons for people to come to the region and stay a few nights, whether it be for a major sporting, music or visual arts festivals, right through to those smaller events, that might focus on our heritage, culture, food and wine.

"The whole idea is to create those much-needed economic drivers so there is something to see and do throughout the year to make the Barossa a vibrant destination for all seasons."

The Annual Events program has a four-tiered funding structure which offers sponsorships of up to \$2,000 for small local events, right through to those considered to be of international, national or state significance which could receive sponsorship upwards of \$10,000.

Online applications for the 2026/27 round are now open and close on 30 June, 2026. A panel from Council's new Visitor Economy and Events Team will assess each application for eligibility before presenting their list, which meet all criteria, to Council's August meeting for sponsorship approval.

"I can't wait to see what exciting event concepts our community comes up with," added Mayor Lange.

Labor's Attack on Aspiration

Australians were promised relief in this Budget. Instead, Labor has delivered higher taxes, more debt and a direct assault on aspiration.

What makes this worse is that Australians have been lied to by the Prime Minister.

Before the election, Anthony Albanese promised more than 50 times there would be no changes to negative gearing or capital gains tax. Yet Labor has now handed down a Budget based on breaking those promises.

Labor's attacks on discretionary trusts are another example. In regional Australia, trusts are used by family farms and small businesses to manage risk and succession. They are not loopholes for the wealthy but part of the engine room of regional economies.

At the same time, Labor's housing taxes will mean 35,000 fewer homes built over the next decade while rents continue to rise for Australians already struggling to find a place to live.

Younger Australians already facing the prospect of never owning a home are now being hit again. Instead of helping them get ahead, Labor is making it harder to save, invest and build financial security. The ladder of opportunity that



previous generations benefited from is being pulled up behind them.

This is not reform. It is intergenerational fraud.

The Coalition will fight these changes in opposition and reverse them in government.

The Coalition is offering a different path which is aimed at restoring living standards, rewarding hard work and putting Australians first. Our plan includes ending bracket creep, linking migration to housing supply, boosting small business investment and strengthening Australia's economic and national security.

Australians deserve a government that rewards aspiration, backs investment and restores the dream of home ownership, not one that punishes Australians for trying to get ahead.

The Foresters

Their correct title was The Ancient Order of the Foresters. A fancy title but who were they? Many of the locals will associate the Foresters with the handsome little building on the corner of Margaret Street and Queen Street. For years it was known as the Forester's Hall. The Foresters have a long history starting in the 1700s. Things were very different then, particularly for the working folk. If you worked in the mines or a factory, and you were injured things would get very grim for you and your family if you had one. If you couldn't work, you lost your job and your meager wage. Without a wage you lost your rented home, you went hungry and you were destitute. The next step was sleeping rough at the Workhouse. Most people preferred to sleep under a bush rather than at the Workhouse. Which says a lot about the Workhouse.

The foresters began in Yorkshire in 1745 and named after the Law Courts of the Royal Forests. They were a benevolent society, nonpolitical or religious, but formed to aid the sick, unemployed, old aged and assist with funeral expenses. Workers paid a few pence of their wages each week. This created a fund for those who needed help. It was a not-for-profit organization managed by volunteers. With no Government pensions or support the Foresters were a ray of hope at a trouble time.

In 1849 the first Court arrived in Victoria, possibly because of the Gold Rush, and spread to the other states. They were referred to as Courts rather than Societies.

The Williamstown Court received its charter on the 11 August 1862. They were popular and most of the leading lights of the town were members. They wore sashes and paraded through the street singing with their impressive banner, believed to have been embroidered by Mrs Wild. Meetings were held in private homes or at local facilities.

After the Williamstown and District Soldiers Memorial Institute was enlarged and reopened in 1924 the little building at the corner of Margaret Street became vacant. The Foresters purchased the building and land and remained there until the mid 1930s, when Federal Government legislation made it impossible for them to function. They still held the title to the hall until it was sold to Morris Kassebaum in 1958.

Although they no longer exist in Australia, they are still alive and well in the United Kingdom under the name of The Foresters Friendly Society. A greatly appreciated group of people, who were an important part of our colourful history.

Their handsome Honor Board, bearing the names of their Chiefs still hangs on the back wall of the Williamstown Institute. Have a look next time you're there.

Proactive and forward-thinking budget

Embargoed until 20 May 2026

The Barossa Council has revealed a draft budget that is proactive, forward thinking and realistic. It balances responsible investment in community priorities while limiting additional pressures on household budgets.

The draft 2026-27 annual business plan and budget proposes an average general rate increase of 3.60% for existing ratepayers. Because rates and service charges vary depending on the services received, an existing ratepayer can expect a total increase of 3.98% if they receive all waste and wastewater services.

Rural ratepayers receive a rate increase that is 50% lower than others at 1.99%, under the proposed plan. This was considered necessary to support primary producers after two years of no rate increases, whilst acknowledging the industry continues to face pressure from weather and global conditions.

Council is encouraging the community to have their say on the draft budget before 5pm, 11 June 2026.

Mayor Bim Lange says the draft plan focuses on sound management and ensuring Council assets are maintained at an appropriate service level for the community.

"We've struck a real balance between planning for the future and maintaining our services and infrastructure over the long-term," he said.

"This plan is about core investment and completion of large projects as we continue to deliver essential services like road infrastructure and footpath networks, all while taking a proactive approach in maintaining our assets."

Council continues to invest in critical infrastructure like transport, stormwater, bridges, footpaths and equipment, with the allocation of \$9.537m.

A new long-term footpath program will invest \$3.524m over the next decade to improve general connectivity across townships, with priority given to links between main streets, schools and medical facilities. This is in addition to normal footpath renewal over this period of \$6.406m.

The delivery of the Barossa Creative Industries Centre will be a key milestone delivered within the 2026-27 financial year. This is as a result of contributions from \$11.849m in project funding under The Big Project for the Barossa Creative Industries Centre, with \$6.9m funded by the Commonwealth and a further \$500,000 from the State, the majority of this being funding carried forward from 2025-26.

And with Concordia expected to commence in 2026-27, Mayor Lange acknowledges Council is also focused on what Concordia is going to bring to the rest of the community.

Other highlights include:

- \$2.25m for maintenance of road, bridge, footpath, kerbing assets, road vegetation and tree management.
- \$1.64m for plant and equipment with a new grader and street sweeper
- \$1.4m for the replacement and upgrade of Moss Road Bridge
- \$298k for resealing of Old Kapunda Road, Nuriootpa
- \$80k to commence designing a new Council depot and location assessment in readiness for Concordia
- \$130k for two significant wastewater management systems at Nuriootpa and Lyndoch
- \$200k Shower and amenity block upgrade at Murray Recreation Park, Eden Valley

Subject to grant funding, funding has been allocated to commence a two-year redevelopment project to upgrade stormwater and footpaths along Yettie Road, Williamstown.

Williamstown – and how we are connected to the colonisation of South Australia, and the world-famous Murray Merinos

In 2026 the State of South Australia will be celebrating the proclamation of the colony at Glenelg on December 28, 1836.

The ship carrying the Governor to be (John Hindmarsh) was the Buffalo and on this ship as a cabin passenger was William Oliver Malcolm.

THE NEW COLONY - SOUTH AUSTRALIA. Captain Hindmarsh and his new Colony are all the rage in the great world of London. At least they were so four months ago, at about the time the Abel Gower left the Thames; and they had been equally so for as many months before that time.

(Sydney Gazette and New South Wales Advertiser Saturday 14 May 1836, page 2)

Of interest is the naming of Sir Pulteney Malcolm who could not attend but had been active behind the scenes

William Oliver Malcolm is credited with the honour of introducing Merinos into South Australia
Many people will wonder – but what has this to do with Williamstown?

Williamstown was formed in 1857, but there was great activity in the general area before that time.

William Oliver Malcolm (nephew of Sir Pulteney Malcolm) had settled on the South Para and raised sheep. His distant relative, Alexander Borthwick Murray made a name for himself in presenting Malcolm's sheep at the earliest show and winning prizes.

From the National Library of Scotland 6684/7

1835 13 July London WEM to GPM you will find amongst the new papers the prospectus regarding South Australia Capt Hindmarsh is the governor – he feels to me he owes his appointment; he takes charge of William Malcolm his safety.

It has been stated that the Malcolms left the area in 1845 (however William Oliver Malcolm was still in the area after this time) however his distant relations, brother Alexander Borthwick Murray and John Murray had settled in the area, initially on Section 918, but later Section 925.

A B Murray left the area in 1854, and John Murray remained in the area and developed the world-famous Murray merino.

The influence of the Murray family is significant in the district John Murray being an elected member of the first District Council of Mount Crawford, and of further significance his son, A J Murray in the supplying funds for the enlargement of the original institute building and later noted a generous friend in the Soldiers Memorial Institute (part of the walls, roof and land was his gift) in 1924.

New life for iconic railway

Angaston's iconic railway station building is set for a new lease of life as part of an exciting commercial activation opportunity in the Barossa.

The Barossa Council is inviting businesses to submit an expression of interest (EOI) for the subsidised lease of the historic station building, which dates from 1911.

Located on the Barossa Trail near the Barossa Adventure Station, the State-heritage listed space is full of character with strong visitor appeal.

Council hopes to revitalise the space as part of a pilot project to active a much-loved but under-utilised space.

Featuring four rooms, undercover outdoor space and on-site toilets, Mayor Bim Lange says the precinct is ideal for hospitality, creative industries, tourism experience or visitor servicing.

"This is a great opportunity for emerging businesses, creative thinkers and innovative operators who can bring something genuinely exciting to the precinct," says Mayor Lange.

"This initiative is designed to increase visitation, support local business and drive more foot traffic between the railway station and Angaston's town centre.

"We are looking for activities that diversify the use and enjoyment of the precinct and welcome collaborations between multiple businesses."

Expressions of interest are non-binding and intended to gather insights around business incubation.
